For over 30 years Sands, the stillbirth and neonatal death charity, has provided emotional support, comfort and practical help to anyone affected by the death of a baby during pregnancy or shortly after birth.

We have played a lead role in changing understanding of the significance and impact of a baby's death, and work in partnership with health professionals to improve the quality of bereavement care offered to families around the time of their baby's death.

Stillbirth rates are similar today to the rates in the late 1990s and too little research is taking place to understand why. We believe this is totally unacceptable and are calling for urgent action to reduce the levels of deaths and actively promoting and funding vital research to reduce the loss of babies' lives.

Stillbirth is ten times more common than cot death

IMPROVING BEREAVEMENT CARE

The care that thousands of bereaved families receive every year around the time of their baby's death is extremely important. Good care cannot remove the pain of loss, but inadequate or poor care makes things worse and affects a family's wellbeing in the short and long term.



Sands has led the way in setting out standards of bereavement care for parents whose baby dies around the time of birth. Sands bereavement care textbook, *Pregnancy Loss and the Death of a Baby: Guidelines for Professionals*, has become essential reading for health professionals supporting parents whose baby has died.

Sands runs bereavement care training in hospitals across the UK, and offers support to medical staff affected by the death of a baby.

It's a common misconception that stillbirths are unavoidable tragedies. In fact over 90% of stillborn babies have no congenital abnormality.

60% of stillbirths are unexplained and too little research is being done to understand why babies die

Around a third of stillborn babies are perfectly formed and normally sized and a third are born at the end of pregnancy when they were preparing for life outside the womb.

Research is desperately needed to understand why babies die in order to develop better antenatal screening tools to identify babies at risk of stillbirth and save lives.

In partnership with the Royal College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists (RCOG) Sands has set up a Stillbirth Clinical Studies Group to encourage new research and we are directly funding research through Sands Research Fund.

Our campaigning has resulted in several important steps forward including the formation of government-backed stillbirth working groups in England, Scotland and Wales bringing together key stakeholders all committed to reducing babies' deaths.
