# Welcome to new groups across the UK

It has been a very exciting time at Sands in the last six months, as many new groups have started across the UK. In the North East, 12 volunteers in Sheffield completed their Part One New Groups Training in April to form Sheffield Sands. We are hoping that support meetings will start in September. The profile of Sands in Sheffield is already being raised through fundraising and awareness. Mamen with friend Anna raised an incredible £953 by running the Sheffield half marathon.

Also in the North East, Wakefield and District Sands officially launched with their first support meeting in February this year. The group completed Part One New Groups Training at the end of January, preparing them for the start of the group.

In March, the group completed Part One New Groups Training. 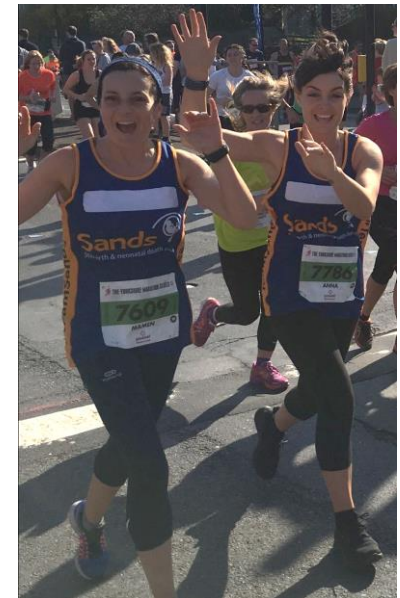
